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Aesthetics

Aims of the course

The module in **Aesthetics** aims at giving a historical and systematic outline of aesthetics as part of Western philosophical thought. In this module students will become familiar with aesthetical concepts and authors which have become classics for the discipline from the Antiquity to the 20th century, with a particular focus on Modernity.

Contents

This module will take into account two main aspects: first, the historical – starting with the Greek "aesthetical considerations" (mainly with Plato); then, the thematic questions, such as beauty, art and taste, considering parts of the main works in Aesthetics in Modern time.

Methodology

The course will consist of readings, class discussion and writing assignments, to be chosen in consultation with the lecturer (presentations).

The lecture of two hours (c.t.) will be divided in two parts. After an introductory presentation with power point, a specific text will be read, analysed and commented. All the texts will be provided the session before, in order to let everyone follow and take actively part in each discussion. Oral presentations of 10 minutes each will be provided by the students.

The final text date will be decided together, whereas the oral exam dates will be: either the 7^{th} of June or the 28^{th} of June at 9 a.m.

The final mark will be based on the quality of your attendance and participation (40%), critical presentations during the course (20%) and final test + oral exam (40%).

A selected bibliography on specific topics will be provided during the lectures as well as original works in English translation according to the necessity of the audience.
